







Why Cover the Challah?

Normally, the blessing on bread proceeds the blessing made on wine. On Shabbos, because we make Kiddush the blessing is made in the reverse order. In order to not "embarrass" the bread we cover it, so that it should not "see" the wine.

Obviously, bread does not have feelings. As we cover the bread we are reminded how careful we must be to not cause another person pain. If we are concerned about the "feelings" of the challah, an inanimate object, how much more so must we be considerate of other's feelings.



dye bottles

fabric



ziplock bag



adult gloves & children's gloves



plastic tablecloth



STEP I

Protect your surface and hands with a plastic tablecloth and gloves.



STEP 2

Fill dye bottle with water almost to the top. Replace cap tightly. Shake until dye is dissolved.



STEP 3

Layout fabric. Pinch and bind with rubber band. Repeat, making as many circles as desired.



STEP 4

Apply dye on fabric, Do not over-saturate fabric. If dye colors are applied too close together, the colors may become muddy.



STEP 5

Place dyed fabric inside ziplock bag and let sit for 8 hours or overnight.




STEP 6

Remove rubber bands. Fully rinse dyed fabric in warm water until water runs clear.



STEP 7

Place by itself in washing machine with a small amount of laundry soap. Set washer to large load setting – warm/hot water. Dry.



STEP 8

Once it's dry decorate if you'd like with puffy paint, fabric markers or ironon transfers.
